Talks in September & October

The talk in September was cancelled at very short notice as we heard that our speaker, Judy Kinnin, had had an accident that day & needed medical attention. Mrs Kinnin contacted the society after her discharge from hospital promising to reschedule her talk as soon as possible. Happily, this will now take place on February 20th, with details below.

October saw a return of Gary Lunt of Reel Tours, speaking on music in the movies. He gave a very entertaining talk on the role of music to set the atmosphere before the time of *The Talkies*, & the impact of modern music on cinema audiences. This led to some attendees in the 1950s & 60s being inflamed into riotous & unbecoming behaviour. However, the audience of Woolton Society members behaved impeccably, with no dancing in the aisles or scuffles in the car park, *as far as we know.*

Plaque on Village Club

The ninth WS plaque has been installed on The Village Club on Allerton Road. The club was opened in 1885 as a place for the whole community to use. The inscription reads "At the heart of the community in Woolton Village"

The plaque was made by Photocast in Speke, a company which has made all the society's plaques, as well as the information spiky beside our tree in Reynolds Park.

Programme of talks for 2025

The talks in February, March & October will be held on Thursday afternoons, starting at 3pm, so avoiding the dark evenings. The talks in April, May & September, the Quiz Night in June & the AGM in November will be on Wednesdays starting at 7.30pm. All talks are held in St Mary's Hall, off Church Road. The hall has step-free access & a large adjacent car park, with bus stops nearby on Church Road. Complimentary refreshments will be served at the afternoon talks from 2.30pm

Thursday 20th February at 3pm, Judy Kinnin: The forced repatriation of Chinese seamen in 1945/6 In a talk postponed from last September, Judy Kinnin will be speaking on her life-long search for information about her father. He disappeared from her life when she was only eighteen months old, with no explanation given to his wife, along with hundreds of other Chinese seamen who had worked for the British navy during wartime. The truth about his disappearance is shocking, & was featured in a BBC television programme: "DNA Family secrets."

Thursday 20th March at 3pm, Martin Land: The Mersey Tidal Power Project

Developing the tidal force of our river could mean generating enough power for thousands of homes & the creation of many local jobs. The region could become a worldwide centre of excellence in a vital

industry of the future. Martin Land will be speaking on the chance to deliver a cleaner & greener future for generations to come.

Wednesday 16th April at 7.30pm, Ken Pye: Beer, Bars & Boozers

The popular speaker & local broadcaster Ken Pye will be returning to speak on Liverpool's numerous pubs, bars & alehouses. He will be bringing a selection of his own books for sale.

Wednesday 21st May at 7.30pm, Paul Wilkie: Liverpool, Home of Citizens Advice.

Paul is the society's long serving deputy chairman & secretary. He is also chairman of the local CAB & will be speaking on the vital role this organisation plays.

Wednesday 18th June at 7.30pm, Quiz night

The seventh annual quiz night will see the 2024 & 2023 champions The Fantastic Four defending their title. All members are invited to take part & challenge the current holders of the coveted Quiz Cup. There will be prizes!

Wednesday 17th September at 7.30pm, Eric Cohen: The history of the Princes Road Synagogue Liverpool once had a large & vibrant Jewish community largely based in the city centre, with this synagogue built in 1874. However, in the twentieth century the community started to move away to the suburbs, such as Childwall & Mossley Hill, with new synagogues built there. The shul on Princes Road has recently celebrated its 150th anniversary with a programme of talks & events. Synagogue elder & guide Eric Cohen will be taking us on a virtual tour of this breathtaking building, built in the Moorish Revival style by architect George Audsley.

Thursday 16th October at 3pm, Alastair Baker: The work of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission

The CWGC is concerned with the care & upkeep of many thousands of war graves, with several in Woolton cemeteries. It honours & cares for the graves of the men & women of the commonwealth forces who died in wars, ensuring that they will never be forgotten.

Wednesday 19th November at 7.30 pm: the fifty second annual general meeting

All society members are invited to the AGM. There will be refreshments after the business of the evening is concluded.

Please note that the society has the use of St Mary's Hall from 2.30 to 4.30 on Thursdays, & from 7 to 9 pm on Wednesdays, to allow for setting up & clearing away. Early attendance by members is appreciated to enable to allow the talks to start promptly at 3pm or 73.0pm.

Subscriptions

All subs became due on 1st September, with the majority of members now paying by standing order. This is much appreciated by the treasurer & membership secretary as banking up cash is a very lengthy business. With the closure of the Allerton Road branch the nearest Barclays is on Lord Street in the city centre. The society has used a card reader for the past year at markets & meetings which has reduced the amount of cash taken.

The society has not raised subs for many years, as membership numbers are sufficient to cover all costs incurred. With membership starting from £4 a year, this is very good value for money.

Good Works continue

Since the fiftieth anniversary in 2022, the WS has made a practice of using a portion of our funds in supporting good causes in the village.

A mini-Christmas tree was sponsored, as in 2023, as the society has pledged to fund a tree for three years.

Fifty copies of pamphlet eleven, A History of Reynolds Park, were donated to the Friends group, & sold well on Reynolds Day in September. The pamphlet was written by FORP chairman Geoff Kendall, & is also available at the market stall & meetings.

Daffodil & tulip bulbs were bought for Woolton in Bloom, & will be planted by volunteers along the dual carriageway, all to keep the village blooming.

The latest plaque was installed in December on the Village Club with several more planned for 2025. All the society's plaques have been manufactured by Photocast, a nationally renowned company based in Speke. The plaques are entirely funded by the society, with no costs at all to the building owners.

The Jubilee tree, a mountain ash, was planted in Reynolds Park in January 2023, & is thriving despite the gales with a brave display of golden berries last Autumn.

All WS outings are subsidised for members, & sometimes free. All talks are free to attend, with complimentary refreshments served at afternoon talks & at the AGM. Visitors are not charged at talks, as it is hoped that membership will result, & often this is the case.

Markets and merchandise.

The society usually takes a stall at the local market which is on the second Saturday of each month. The dates for 2025 are:

8th February, 8th March, 12th April, 10th May, 14th June, 12th July, 9th August, 13th September, 11th October, 8th November, 13th December.

The markets are an excellent way of publicising the society, with many new members joining after chatting with the committee members manning the stall. Merchandise as well as information is available, with the society's two books & eleven pamphlets on sale, as well as a tea towel (£6) showing images of the village, & designed by WS member Jenny Brown. There are also a few high-quality cotton aprons still available, now reduced to £6, with a design by local artist Sandra Hepworth.

Woolton News

Woolton in Bloom

There are still a few copies of the 2025 WIB calendar available, at the market stall & at Brown's newsagent on Woolton Street (428 2408). The calendar's theme is the Open Gardens Day in July last year, when a dozen local gardens were opened to visitors. The next open day will be in 2026

The displays in the village centre have been the target of vandalism in recent months, notably many plants were uprooted hours after they were put in for the winter display. The volunteers were downhearted at seeing their work vandalised reeatedly. Local schools have been asked to provide more security at the beginning & end of the school day, which seems to be having an effect.

Work parties of volunteers go out on Wednesdays & Saturdays, planting & weeding, led by horticultural manager Kerry Peacock. Their work keeps Woolton blooming, as no financial aid is received from the council. Those wishing to take part should meet at the lock-up opposite the car park on High Street at 10am on those days, or enquire at the WIB stall on market days.

In September WIB commissioned an information spiky to accompany the tree planted on Kings Drive to commemorate the coronation of King Charles in May 2023.

Friends of Reynolds Park

The park has suffered during the past months, with trees blown down & left lying on the ground. In early January a tree fell across the entrance to the walled garden, blocking the entrance.

At the time of writing the gate is still blocked, with the area taped off. A council official has been to inspect the damage, with action to remove the tree promised as soon as possible.

The wall to the garden is also still down after being damaged by the gales of January 2024, with no date yet set for any remedial work as a procurement process has to be completed. It is a tragedy that the council's cost cutting has removed all but the most basic services to the city's parks which are rapidly deteriorating & becoming weed infested. It is a tribute to Peter, the devoted regular gardener at Reynolds Park, that the walled garden has remained an oasis of beauty.





The sundial has now been replaced, with the inscription Solem quis dicere falsum audent (or Who will dare to say that the sun is wrong.)

FORP chairman Geoff Kendall is the author of the latest WS pamphlet, number 11, *A History of Reynolds Park* which is selling well.

There will be a Spring Clean Litter Pick in the park on Saturday 22nd March from 10am to 12pm.

Fifty years before women won the vote, a legal loophole allowed up to one thousand women to vote in the general election of 1868. This was because of the single-minded dedication of Lydia Becker, the unofficial leader of the women's suffrage movement in the late nineteenth century.
